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Horticultural Notes

The September Garden

Ahh, September, bitter sweet. We are tired of the heat, looking forward to going into the new season, but also so sad to see the end of summer signaled by those cooler nights and the first hints of fall color and streaks of yellow golden rod.

I like to think of September as both a beginning and an ending, and an exciting time in the garden. Cooler nights and a little bit more rain encourage the September garden to be beautiful. And we can help! Religious deadheading, throughout the summer, and certainly now, can keep the garden tidy and encourage continued blooming.

Deadheading can also provide some control over those plants which would happily take over the earth as well as the rest of the garden; for example, some of the Cranesbill, Geraniums, or the Spirea, shrubs, and earlier in the season, Lady's Mantle.



September brings the beginning of mums and asters, but, best of all, Colchicum. White Flower Farm describes the magical appearance of Colchicums which “rise without warning and glisten in the sharp light of autumn”.

These bulbs throw a clump of broad, deer proof leaves in the spring, which are gone by mid-summer. They want full or part sun and prefer well drained soil that doesn't dry out in the summer.

My favorite is Colchicum Autumnale Alboplenum which has creamy white flowers up to 4 inches across with as many as 8 blooms on each plant. Odyssey Bulbs points out that although Colchicums common name is Autumn Crocus, Colchicums are from a different plant family: Colchicums are from the Liliaceae and croci are from the Iridaceae.



September is a wonderful time for nibbling in the vegetable garden. Some of the herbs, like parsley, welcome the cooler nights, as do broccoli, cabbage, kale (to name favorites in my garden).

And nibbling can continue into November! But, I've learned that you can also seed new plants in September. Hart Seeds has a Fall Planting Varieties Collection of seeds that can be planted late August into September which includes dill, cilantro, parsley, mustard, arugula, kale, cherry belle radishes and little finger carrots.
